# JLBC Releases Classroom Site Fund Estimate

The Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) is required to annually determine by March 30 of each year the estimated K-12 Classroom Site Fund (CSF) per pupil amount for the upcoming budget year (A.R.S. § 15-977G1).

The CSF is funded from the Proposition 301 0.6¢ sales tax and state land trust earnings. Statute requires the calculation of the per pupil amount to be based on projected weighted student counts and CSF revenues for the budget year, adjusted for any prior year carry forward or shortfall. Under these parameters, JLBC estimates that public schools will receive \$423 per weighted pupil from the CSF for FY 2019 from both a cash and "budget capacity" perspective. The \$423 per pupil amount would be higher than the estimated \$386 per pupil amount for FY 2018 because of higher projected Proposition 301 sales tax revenues and state land trust earnings for FY 2019.

# Legislative Session Snapshot

The 53<sup>rd</sup> Legislature, Second Regular Session marks its 82<sup>nd</sup> day of the legislative session today. A total of 1,165 bills and 118 memorials/resolutions have been introduced, of that 139 bills have passed and 89 have been signed into law.

Some upcoming legislative deadlines are as follows:

- Friday, April 13 is the final day for conference committees.
- Tuesday, April 17 marks the 100<sup>th</sup> day of the Legislative Session.

# CSA Legislative Agenda: Another Bill Signed

This week another CSA bill was signed into law, <u>HB 2190 county improvement districts; repayment agreements</u> (*Mitchell*). The status of CSA's legislative agenda package is as follows:

- 1) <u>HB 2190 county improvement districts; repayment agreements</u> (*Mitchell*) Passed the House 57-0. Passed Senate 29-0, and signed into law, **Chapter 80**.
- 2) <u>HB 2274 county contributions: hospitalization: medical; repeal</u> (*Thorpe*) –Passed the House 58-0, transmitted to the Senate. Referred to Senate Health & Human Services and Appropriations.
- 3) <u>HB 2413 public road maintenance: primitive designation</u> (*Cook*) Passed the House 58-0, passed the Senate 29-1 and signed into law, **Chapter 16**.
- 4) <u>HB 2415 juvenile dependency proceedings fund</u> (*Cobb*) –Passed the House 51-7, transmitted to the Senate. Passed the Senate Judiciary Committee 7-0, passed Senate Appropriations, awaiting Rules.

- HB 2439 county contributions: committee youth: repeal (*Thorpe*) –Passed the House 55-3, transmitted to the Senate. Passed the Senate Judiciary Committee 6-0-1, passed Senate Appropriations, awaiting Rules.
- 6) <u>SB 1038 state land payments: payment method</u> (*Griffin*)-Passed the Senate 30-0, passed the House 57-1-2 and was signed into law, **Chapter 18**.
- 7) <u>SB 1113 zoning violations: notice: service</u> (*Fann*)-Passed the Senate 23-5, transmitted to the House. Passed House Local & International Affairs, Rules and Caucus. Awaiting House COW.
