CSA Board Hears from ASU Water Policy Expert

At the November CSA Board of Directors meeting, Professor Rhett Larson, representing the Arizona State University (ASU) Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law, provided a presentation on the history of Arizona's water laws and policy.

Professor Larson touched on a number of topics, including the Colorado River Compact, managing groundwater, and the various uncertainties surrounding the resolution of water rights. He also addressed the future of water in the west,





discussing traditional and non-traditional methods such as watershed management, desalination, and cloud seeding.

In addition to teaching law at ASU, Professor Larson is a Senior Research Fellow with the Kyl Center for Water Policy, where he works on dispute resolution and improved processes in water rights adjudications.

ACJC Director Presents to CSA Board

On Thursday, the Executive Director of the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACJC), Andrew LeFevre presented to the CSA Board of Directors about the role his organization plays in the criminal justice system.

Mr. LeFevre discussed the history and purpose of ACJC, noting, "ACJC is a statutorily authorized entity mandated to carry out various coordinating, monitoring and reporting functions regarding the administration and management of criminal justice programs in Arizona." He expressed gratitude for Graham County Supervisor Drew John's active participation as a member of the ACJC board. Mr. LeFerve also thanked CSA for their ongoing collaboration and advocacy at the state legislature.



ACJC was created in 1982 to serve as a resource and service organization for

Arizona's 480 criminal justice agencies on a myriad of issues ranging from drugs, gangs, victim compensation and assistance to criminal record improvement initiatives. The ACJC works on behalf of the criminal justice agencies in Arizona to facilitate information and data exchange among state-wide agencies by establishing and maintaining criminal justice information archives, monitoring new and continuing legislation relating to criminal justice issues and gathering information and researching existing criminal justice programs.

Announcing the Arizona Natural Resources Users Law & Policy Center

Cindy DeLancey, the Executive Director of the University of Arizona (UofA) Natural Resources Users Law and Policy Center joined the CSA Board of Directors to introduce her new program.

"The university is breaking new ground and is leading the way for agriculture and law students to work shoulder-to-shoulder with farmers, ranchers, miners and other natural resource users to impact law and public policy across the west," said Ms. DeLancey. She went on to share that she wanted to use her center to help counties engage with regulatory processes.

The center is a partnership between UofA's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences (CALS) Cooperative Extension and the James E. Rogers College of Law, and is the first university-based and cooperative extension-based natural resources users' legal center in the nation. The center will include a Natural Resources Users Public Interest Law Clinic staffed by law and CALS students to address the unmet legal needs of ranchers, farmers, miners, and others who work with natural resources.
