Chief Justice Bales Presents to Board of Directors

On December 15, the Chief Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court, Scott Bales, addressed the County Supervisors Association Board of Directors, during their monthly meeting. Chief





Justice Bales, who was appointed to the court by Governor Janet Napolitano in 2008, talked about a number of topics of interest to county leaders. He discussed the Fair Justice for All Task Force, juvenile justice and justice reform.

The Fair Justice for All Task Force aims to set fines and penalties to mitigate the impact for individuals who are encountering economic hardships to ensure that they are not unduly harmed by penalties or hindered in their employment. The Chief Justice also talked about security at the courts and acknowledged that security measures could be costly, especially for smaller counties.

Status of the Arizona State Budget

On Thursday, Richard Stavneak, the Joint Legislative Budget Committee Director, briefed the Board of Directors regarding the current status of the Arizona State Budget.

Mr. Stavneak highlighted that the 2018 cash balance is \$101 million, but the structural balance is only \$24 million. He shared that these numbers are expected to shift by January, however JLBC doesn't anticipate any significant changes. Currently there is \$460 million in the rainy day fund, with a projected cash reserve of \$560 million.

Additionally, Mr. Stavneak discussed some ongoing challenges to the state, including pending litigation, the decision to continue one time funding (or not), and new initiatives despite limited resources.



The legislative session will convene on January 9, 2017 and Governor Ducey is expected to release his budget by the end of that week.

On December 17, 1923, figures showed that Arizona led the nation in effectiveness of prohibition enforcement. Convictions were estimated at 97 percent. Ten years later, Prohibition officially ended on December 5, 1933 with the ratification of the Twenty-first Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.
