Arizona Legislature Nearing Key Deadlines

Today marks the 26th day of the 53rd Legislative Session. As of today, 931 bills and 85 memorials/resolutions have been introduced. Customarily, around 1,200 pieces of legislation are introduced each session prior to the bill introduction deadline.

This past Monday was the deadline for senators to introduce new bills for consideration. House members have until next Friday, February 10, to introduce new legislative proposals.

As we approach the deadline for bills to be heard in their chamber of origin, committee agendas are packed as members push to have their bills heard on time. This is causing lengthy committee hearings with some lasting several hours.

The last day for bills to be considered in their chamber of origin is February 17 and the last day for committee hearings to hear bills from the opposite chamber is March 24.



As always, our staff will continue to analyze and monitor each bill as it moves through the process and we will determine if it has an impact on our counties.


CSA's legislative agenda continues to move forward. Please see below for a list of our bills:

- 1) HB 2065 waste tire disposal; continuation (Coleman), passed the House 59-0.
- 2) HB 2230 intergovernmental public transportation authority: taxation (Shooter), passed House Transportation & Infrastructure, 8-0-0; also referred to House Ways & Means.
- 3) HB 2258 county contributions; hospitalization; medical; repeal (Thorpe), will be heard on Wednesday February 8, in House Appropriations at 2:00 p.m., in House Hearing Room 1; also referred to House Health.
- 4) HB 2332 property tax valuation appeals (Campbell), referred to House Ways & Means.
- 5) HCR 2011 motor vehicle fuel taxes (Campbell), will be heard on Wednesday February 8, in House Transportation & Infrastructure at 2:00 p.m., in House Hearing Room 3; also referred to House Ways & Means.

Explorer which is an interactive online tool which gives county officials access to extensive county-specific data.



But did you know that Arizona lays claim to its very own prognosticator, Agua Fria Freddie? Although Freddie, a shadow-seeking rattlesnake, is not as well-known as his furry friend Phil, he holds a place in the hearts of many Arizonans. Legend has it that if Freddie sees his shadow as he slips out of his shelter on February 2, winter is over in Arizona. If the slithering serpent casts no shadow at all, then it's six more weeks of winter for us. Though it is

almost impossible to get down low enough to determine if the venomous visionary actually saw his shadow, Freddie is said to be able to predict the coming of spring with more than 98% accuracy.

Unfortunately for those in the chillier states, Punxsutawney Phil glimpsed his shadow as he scuttled out of his stump, thus foretelling six more weeks of cold, wintry weather. For us here in Arizona, where most of the state is anticipating weather in the 70's and 80's for at least the next few weeks, I think it's fair to say we'll stick with Freddie's forecast.
