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## Research & Data Initiative

## **Public Safety Retention & Recruitment Study:**

As a part of the stakeholder working group established by Laws 2022, Ch. 351, CSA facilitated an \$800,000 grant through the Arizona Board of Regents (ABOR) Community Grant to study retention and recruitment for law enforcement officers and fire fighters across the state.

CSA served as the liaison between the working group and the university researchers. In that role, CSA met regularly with each research team, distributed surveys, coordinated data requests, provided guidance on research plans and interfaced with various stakeholders. Additionally, CSA staff served as the chair of the Total Compensation working group subcommittee, helping guide and facilitate the development of policy recommendations based on research findings.

**Final Report** was published in January 2024, which includes 6 different reports to inform local decisions.

## **Detention Personnel Retention & Recruitment Study:**

In partnership with the Arizona Sheriffs' Association, CSA secured a \$300,000 grant from ABOR to study workforce challenges in county jail facilities.

CSA & ASA staff will help guide and facilitate various research projects conducted by ASU and UA. Research will be conducted from June 2024 to Spring 2025, with final research reports anticipated in **July 2025**.

#### **Local Government Procurement Model Study:**

In partnership with the League of Arizona Cities & Towns, CSA secured a \$300,000 grant from ABOR to examine procurement tools and models that could be implemented to measurably reduce costs and improve processes for local governments.

Research will include interviews and surveys of procurement professionals in Arizona, identifying metrics for cost efficiency and risk management, and analyzing nationwide best practices/case studies.

Initial research reports anticipated in August 2025.

## **Expenditure Limit Resource Guide Expanded:**

In addition to existing resources to support county decisions around expenditure limit exemptions, CSA expanded the <a href="Expenditure Limit Resource Guide">Expenditure Limit Resource Guide</a> to be a comprehensive overview of constitutional expenditure limits, their history & available resources for counties.

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## **Supporting BEAD Deployment**

As a part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, Arizona received a \$993.1 million Broadband Equity Access and Deployment Program (BEAD) grant from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration.

CSA has served in an intergovernmental role to connect counties with the Arizona State Broadband Office as they plan for how the state will use the grant to deploy broadband to all unserved and underserved households in Arizona.
