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Grand Canyon 100th Anniversary



February 26th was the 100th anniversary of the Grand Canyon. The Grand Canyon was established as a national park on February 26, 1919 by President Woodrow Wilson. During the first year that the Grand Canyon was established as part of the National Park System, approximately 40,000 people visited it. Since then, over 200 million people have visited the Grand Canyon. Governor Ducey states that "The Grand Canyon is more than an Arizona treasure" but that "It's a national treasure that brings visitors from around the world. On the 100th anniversary of the Grand Canyon, we come together to admire this natural wonder and commit to continue preserving its magnificence for generations to come."



The Grand Canyon spans over a million acres within Coconino County and Mohave County. Coconino County Supervisor Art Babbott participated in the <u>Grand Canyon's Centennial</u> celebration with Arizona Secretary of

State Katie Hobbs, Grand Canyon Conservancy, and the dedicated Park staff. To view the performances from the choirs of Sechrist and Knowles Elementary school, click <u>here</u>.

Each year, over 6.2 million recreational visitors come to see the Grand Canyon. In 2017 those visitors spent more than \$667 million in the communities surrounding the park. Highlighted in Governor Ducey's commendation in honor of the 100th anniversary was that the Grand Canyon has created \$938 million in economic benefits and more than 9,000 jobs for the local communities surrounding the park. 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Legislative Session Snapshot

The 54th Legislature, First Regular Session marks its 47th day of the legislative session today. 1289 bills and 96 memorials/resolutions have been introduced this session.

Next week bills that have made it through their house of origin will start to be heard in the opposite chamber and will have until March 29th to be heard.

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CSA Legislative Update

The status of CSA's legislative agenda package is as follows:

- 1) CSA Legislative Budget Priorities
 - <u>SB 1140 county contributions; committed youth; repeal</u> (*Leach*), Passed the Senate with unanimous support and is scheduled to be heard in House Appropriations on March 6th.
 - <u>HB 2429 appropriations; EORP contributions; counties</u> (*Thorpe*), passed out of House Government with a vote of 10 ayes and 1 nay and House Appropriations unanimously and is pending rules.
 - <u>SB 1293 appropriations; EORP contributions; counties</u> (*Gowan*) passed Senate Thursday with a vote of 28-2 and is pending committee assignment in the House.
- 2) HB 2143 Water Basin Advisory Councils (Cobb)/S/E HB 2467 west basin water users; committee (Cobb) A striker was added to on to allow for study committees within the Mohave and La Paz County Water Basins. The bill passed out of Natural Resources, Energy and Water committee with a unanimous vote and is pending rules.
- 3) HB 2316 junk vehicles; removal; counties (Campbell), held pending committee assignment.
- 4) <u>HB 2277 indigent defense funds</u> (*Biasiucci*), passed out of House Judiciary with unanimous support and has been held due to the budget impact.
- 5) <u>HB 2702 TPT; marketplace facilitators; nexus</u> (Toma), passed out of the Ways and Means Committee with a vote of 8-2 and is pending rules.
- 6) SB 1084 funeral; last illness; expenses; lien (Borrelli), Passed the Senate with unanimous support and has been sent to the House and is pending committee assignment.

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NACo Webinar: Rigorous Evidence 101 & Research Clearinghouses

On March 27, NACo will host a webinar along with the Pew Charitable Trusts on Evidence-Based Policymaking. Staff from the Pew-MacArthur Results First Initiative (Results First) will provide an overview on types of evidence, what constitutes rigorous evidence, and then discuss how to find that evidence by utilizing research clearinghouses. A live demo of the Clearinghouse Database will highlight its key features and tips for finding evidence in the database. The Clearinghouse Database is an online resource comprised of data from nine national clearinghouses on the effectiveness of social policy programs. A county official will also be participating in the webinar, discussing how she has used the Clearinghouse Database to enhance her work as a county official.
